Desperate Need for More Volunteers

In observing Club activities over the past year, it is clear the continued operation of the Club is dependent on a small group of dedicated volunteers. Thirty five or so Club members are responsible for managing the archery and gun range activities; operating the hatchery; maintaining the grounds and facilities, as well as supporting the hall rental events. Within this group there is even a smaller number of volunteers who have stepped up to fill the numerous gaps in our volunteer roles. These individuals spend up to, and in some cases over, 80 hours a month to ensure the rest of the 700 Club members can enjoy the benefits of Club membership. This level of effort is unsustainable.

In the past couple of years we have lost a number of long term key volunteers. It is essential that existing Club members step up to help fill the gaps in our volunteer ranks. There are a wide range of roles needed to be filled. Some of these require people who are retired or contemplating retirement, who could be available during week days. However, there are other roles which can be carried out on Saturday mornings or even at home.

Over the past five or six years the Club Executive have worked very hard to improve and expand Club facilities as well as ensure the financial stability of the Club. We have attained these goals but without the required number of volunteers these achievements will be of little value.

End of This Year's Wedding Season





Perhaps there is no better example of the dedication of our volunteers than demonstrated by the four Club members who oversee the 25 or so weddings held in the hall on an annual basis. These four individuals are responsible for showing the hall to prospective renters; signing rental agreements; interfacing with the wedding parties; supervising the hall set up and the wedding reception, as well as maintaining the hall.

The revenue from weddings and other hall rental events provide the funds necessary to continue Club operations. This revenue is significantly higher than the combined revenue generated from all other Club income sources, including membership fees and archery and gun range activities.

So thanks to the volunteers who are dedicated to booking the weddings and who give up their Friday or Saturday nights to supervise these functions. Their success is validated by the fact we are nearly fully booked for weddings next year.

The area is adjacent to both the range and the existing small gardening storage space. An internal wall divides the space with each side having their own access door. In recent years this space became an open storage area for equipment and a wide range of material. By storing gun targets and other range material in the new storage room, it will now be possible to open the small range area in the hall basement for other purposes.

HATCHERY SCHOOL TOUR GUIDE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

We are in need of additional volunteers to host the elementary school classes that tour the hatchery and grounds during March, April and May. Over 70 school classes will visit the hatchery as part of the "Salmon in the Classroom program. The classes are from schools in Richmond, Delta and Surrey.

These classes receive fertilized Coho salmon eggs from the hatchery during December. The eggs are placed in aquariums in their classrooms that have been provided by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. When these eggs hatch into "fry" in March the school teachers schedule their classes to visit the hatchery.

We usually have two classes scheduled in the morning and two in the afternoon during school hours. Depending on the proximity of the school to the Club grounds the students will arrive by bus or by car pool. Aside from the teachers and their aides a number of parents may also attend.

The visit usually takes about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours and is made up of four parts:

- A video of the life cycle of the salmon & information on what can be found on our nature trails
- View of the salmon fry in the hatchery
- Release of the salmon that they have raised in their classroom into the river
- Walk around the nature trails

The tour guides present the video; show the students through the hatchery and walks the nature trails. The release of the salmon into the river is handled by hatchery volunteers Sue MacRae and Roy Thomson. It is not a very challenging chore and it is a very enjoyable experience. Any volunteers will receive instruction and will be walked through the process until they are comfortable. They can also join the experienced guides during the early March tours. As many students, teachers and parents have commented —"it is the best field trip ever".
